Horizons

When we first became a member of a Masonic Lodge, we were greeted by a group of men we soon came to know as Brothers. As we attended our meetings and grew more accustomed to the Masonic ritual and culture, we grew more comfortable with what had initially seemed to be a uniquely peculiar set of rules, practices, and even language. Because of the Lodge friendships we were forming and the lessons we were learning through the ritual, educational programs and Lodge events, we were gradually learning



just what it meant to be a member of our great Fraternity. Our new Brothers became more than just work friends, or even fraternity brothers, they became Lodge Brothers. Brothers whom we then knew as men we could depend upon for their instruction, guidance, reassurance and, especially, good example. It is natural that we were rapidly able to form closely knit friendships with our Brothers. Typically, at this early stage, our Masonic "horizon" was limited to our home lodge, and possibly, if we were fortunate to be in a District where the members were encouraged to meet and work with the members of the other Lodges within our Masonic District, we realized that the Brothers in those other Lodges were no different than, and just as dependable as those of our own.

As we continued to learn about our Fraternity, we soon realized that our home Lodge family - our "Mother Lodge," and our District, with which we had become so comfortable - was but one part of an even larger, world-wide Masonic family. We soon learned that many of our Lodge Brothers were also participating in other groups, or Appendant Bodies, within our Masonic family. Because our trusted home Lodge Brothers were among those who were involved in those exotic new activities, we soon followed their example and recommendations and decided to join with them to learn about the advanced studies those Bodies promised.

As a result of the added association with the new group, we soon realized that it was not in competition with our home Lodge, but rather was a welcomed extension of it. The new group not only reinforced and expanded on the lessons of our Lodge, but also introduced us to additional Brothers we had not previously met. We quickly realized that these new Brothers were just like those whom we had learned to trust as family members, and that this expanded family was far larger than we had ever expected. Many of us were so impressed by the expansive nature of our Brotherhood, we wanted to learn the lessons of even additional Appendant Bodies and to expand our Masonic associations with them. We realized that in all those Bodies we were finally able to enjoy fellowship with a far greater number of Masonic Brothers whom we had not had the opportunity to meet.

Plan Ahead

Annual Visit to **James Madison University** and the **David Kruger Summer Clinic**

July 8, 2025

The lesson I learned from this experience was that my Masonic family was far larger than my home Lodge. I learned that the same initial experience I had in my Lodge was no different than the experiences of learning the peculiar set of rules, practices, and even language in each of the new Appendant Bodies that I eventually joined... and just like in my Mother Lodge and Masonic District, I quickly came to know and to trust my new Brothers... of each of the many various Bodies. I realized that by availing myself of the many benefits of the larger numbers of our Masonic Brothers, I could expand my horizons beyond my Lodge, to include all my Brothers in the Valley, the Chapter, and so on. Further, since each Body's local organization routinely participated in State-Wide or Regional or even National gatherings, I learned I that could meet Brothers and establish new friendships on a far-greater scale than I ever could in my own home-town and local area.

Beyond our own Scottish Rite Valley, we have opportunities to expand our Fraternal horizons to the State-Wide Orient level by attending our annual Virginia Scottish Rite Workshops and Conferences; this year we recently attended and greeted old friends at the Workshop in Richmond on March 29, and now look forward to our SR Conference of VA that will be hosted by Portsmouth Valley in Virginia Beach on September 26-28. Prior to that Conference, our Supreme Council's Biennial Session will be held August 17-19 at the Washington Hilton in D.C. Although the primary focus of the session is on our own Southern Jurisdiction, representatives and visitors from other Scottish Rite Jurisdictions from around the world will be present - this is an excellent opportunity to witness the world-wide reach and impact of your Scottish Rite. You may either register to attend open portions of the session or take advantage of the free, live-streamed open session on Monday, 18 August.

One last note. I have often been asked about Appendant Bodies by a new Lodge Brother, or even by someone who is considering petitioning a Lodge and has become confused by what he may have read or heard about the many components of Masonry. I have found that the easiest way to explain the many parts of the Masonic family, is simply to compare it to a University. The University has many students who are pursuing an education focused on various fields of study. As in our Masonic Lodge, all the students must be accepted by the parent University, or in our case their recognized Grand Lodge, but once accepted, they all continue a common core set of studies, eventually focusing on one or more specialized fields of study. They also, as members of the University's student body, may join other of the school's groups such as sports teams, theatrical or musical groups, or "Greek" fraternal groups... yet they all remain enrolled students of the same University - - - just as we all remain Brothers and beneficiaries of the unlimited horizons of Freemasonry.

Master of Kadosh's Message

Hello, my fellow Brethren, I would like to thank you all for your support and for electing me as the Master of Kadosh. I would also like to pass on some information as to the meaning of the title. Why, might you ask, since we have all been through this degree? It has become a bit of a surprise to me finding out how many of our Masonic brethren have not yet gone through the Scottish Rite degrees. This revelation came to me when asked to stand at my Blue Lodge as a head of an appendant body. Then once again as being installed in the Eastern Star and finally during the monthly stated meeting at the Kena Shrine temple.



Then, I started receiving questions on what "Kadosh" means. The word "Kadosh" is derived from Hebrew and means "Holy" or "Consecrated" -- signifying a state of spiritual elevation and distinction from the mundane, aligning with the divine. Our Southern Jurisdiction calls the 30th Degree, "Knight Kadosh." This degree teaches Masons to "Arm yourself with faith in God, love toward your fellow men and knowledge¹."

The Knight Kadosh is the final degree of the Council of Kadosh, which includes the 19th through 30th degrees. These degrees are often described as philosophical and chivalric, exploring man's historical quest for truth.

I also get asked why the Southern Jurisdiction of the Scottish Rite has four different head of bodies. The reason the Southern Jurisdiction of the Scottish Rite has four different head bodies (or bodies that confer degrees) because each body focuses on a specific range of degrees within the 32 degrees of the Scottish Rite system:

- The Lodge of Perfection (4th-14th degrees). This body focuses on the "Ineffable Degrees," which explore the investigation and contemplation of the ineffable name of Deity.
- The Chapter of Rose Croix (15th-18th degrees). This body delves into the mysteries of the Rose Croix, exploring themes of symbolism and spiritual understanding.
- The Council of Kadosh (19th-30th degrees). This body continues the exploration of Masonic philosophy and history, with a focus on the "Kadosh" or "Holy" degrees.
- The Consistory (31st-32nd degrees). The Consistory is the highest body in the Scottish Rite system, where the 31st and 32nd degrees are conferred, culminating the Masonic journey in the Scottish Rite.

As the weather gets warmer, our Alexandria Valley has a lot going on. Our May stated meeting is on May 27. This is the Ladies Appreciation Dinner. Make sure to invite your wives. I plan to have Pastor Ashley Allen from Oakton United Methodist Church provide the ladies with a mental health and wellness discussion.

RSVP to the Alexandria Valley Secretary for meal planning <u>NLT May 22</u>. Later in the year I have asked Bro. Bennett Hart to do a presentation on the Civil War Lodges.

The Importance of Membership Outreach

Scottish Rite membership is an enriching experience that enhances Masonic knowledge, strengthens fraternal bonds, and supports charitable causes. As Scottish Rite Masons, we all play a role in expanding our Valley by introducing the benefits of membership to our Blue Lodge brethren. One of the most effective tools at our disposal is the **Scottish Rite Membership Brochure**. These should be prominently displayed at Lodge meetings and events, ensuring that Brethren who are not yet members can learn about our work and how they can be a part of it.

Engagement with Blue Lodges

A key strategy for growth is maintaining strong engagement with our Blue Lodges. Each Lodge in our Valley has a **Scottish Rite Lodge Representative** dedicated to keeping Brethren informed about Scottish Rite opportunities. However, every member is a **membership ambassador**—we all have a responsibility to share our experiences and explain how Scottish Rite Masonry can further enrich the Masonic journey. A simple conversation can spark interest, and a well-placed brochure can answer many questions.

The Value of Scottish Rite Masonry

Scottish Rite membership offers deep philosophical teachings, monthly educational presentations, and programs like the **Master Craftsman Course**, which provides university-level Masonic learning. Beyond education, it fosters lifelong friendships that extend beyond our home Lodges, creating a network of likeminded Brethren across the region. Additionally, our philanthropic efforts, such as **RiteCare**, support children with speech and language disorders through 178 clinics in the Southern Jurisdiction. These aspects make Scottish Rite an essential and rewarding part of the Masonic journey.

Recruitment for the October Reunion

With the next **Reunion in October**, now is the time to actively seek new members. Each Lodge should set a modest goal of bringing in at least **one candidate**. The best way to encourage Brethren to join is through **personal conversations**, sharing how Scottish Rite has positively impacted our own Masonic journey. It is helpful to prepare a short **30-second introduction** that highlights key benefits, such as expanded Masonic education, deeper philosophical exploration, and the strong fraternal bonds within our Valley.

Taking Action

- 2. Distribute membership brochures, ensuring they are visible and available at Lodge meetings.
- 3. Encourage prospective members to scan the QR code on the brochure to access the Alexandria Valley Petition.
- **4. Follow up with interested Brethren**, answering questions and guiding them toward membership.

By sharing our enthusiasm, being prepared with key talking points, and following up with potential members, we can **grow our Scottish Rite Valley** while providing new Brethren with an opportunity to expand their Masonic knowledge and connections. Together, we can make the upcoming **October Reunion a great success!**





THE CORRECT POSITION DURING SCOTTISH RITE PRAYER

Predicated upon its basic foundation of belief in a personal God, the Scottish Rite gives primary importance in its Degrees and at its meetings to prayer. While there is an established position and sign to be used by all Scottish Rite Masons during prayer. this position and sign are sometimes not uniformly practiced. Scottish Rite Masons (except when engaged m ritual at the altar) stand during prayer, with caps remaining on the head as part of a uniform. So much is known and done. What is also required is giving the accompanying "Sign of the Good Shepherd." This is done by folding the arms, the left over the right, with the outstretched fingers touching the shoulders. This position is comfortable and easily remembered if it is realized that the sign represents the Good Shepherd carrying a lamb around his neck and holding its feet by his crossed hands. During the prayer, in this position, the head is slightly bowed.
